

DISCOVER REMOTE ISLANDS AND SHORELINES

In recent decades, Iceland has become a tourism hotspot, and once-quiet areas of the island nation are now flooded with people eager to see its churning volcanoes and bubbling geysers. Most land-based travelers zero in on popular destinations like the Blue Lagoon or Thingvellir National Park–places shared en masse across social media.

An expedition cruise is your passport to the parts of the country overlooked by the tourist hordes. Exploring by sea allows you to cover more ground and reach remote corners that few will ever see. In secluded coves and rugged fjords, Zodiacs bring you into the wild without the need for existing infrastructure—and in a fraction of the time it would take for overland visitors.



LEARN FROM LOCAL EXPERTS AND LUMINARIES

Aboard small expedition ships, you'll enjoy plenty of face time with people at the top of their fields. National Geographic certified photo instructors help you capture nesting puffins and otherworldly sulfur cauldrons, and naturalists shed light on volcanism and whale migrations. Cultural specialists interpret the unique customs you'll come across, and many departures feature onboard performances from local artists who weave together music and stories, offering an in-depth look at rural lcelandic life.

BEYOND THE BLUE LAGOON 7 UNIQUE ICELANDIC EXPERIENCES

Exploring Iceland by small ship opens an entirely new realm of possibility, taking you to the far-flung, unspoiled corners of this enchanting subarctic isle. Go beyond the Blue Lagoon to glimpse Iceland's natural wonders in their wild glory and the daily rhythms of life that have remained much the same for generations.

LEARN THE HISTORY OF THE HERRING INDUSTRY

The Herring Era Museum in Siglufjörður showcases the fisheries that transformed this fjord-side town into a thriving city in the early 1900s. Witness the "herring girls" give a reenactment of fish processing, then take a taste of pickled herring.

HIKE A CRATER WHERE THE EARTH IS STILL HOT

Heimaey island has risen from the ashes of its infamous 1973 eruption. On a hike to the rim of Eldfell crater, pass pockets of steam that still rise from the earth, and see the "Pompeii of the North," where ash-preserved houses have been excavated.



WITNESS ICELAND'S REWILDING

Birch forests once covered up to 40 percent of Iceland, but the agriculture of 9th-century settlers led to deforestation. On a guided walk through young woodlands, learn how communities are reforesting their regions with native species.

WALK A CANYON STEEPED IN SAGA

According to Norse mythology, the u-shaped Ásbyrgi Canyon was formed by the hoof of Sleipnir, Odin's eightlegged horse. Other myths name Ásbyrgi as the capital of Iceland's "hidden people," the Huldufólk.

CROSS THE ARCTIC CIRCLE

The tiny isle of Grimsey is bisected by the Arctic Circle, and you can make a crossing on foot or at sea. Another attraction is the large puffin colony. More than 80,000 breeding pairs nest here between April and August.

DELVE INTO THE WORLD OF WHALES

The Husavik Whale Museum is one of the only museums in the world dedicated entirely to whales. Exhibits cover topics ranging from whale ecology to conservation, and include artful displays of 11 massive skeletons.

GLIMPSE TRADITIONAL EIDERDOWN FARMING

Vigur island is both a seabird sanctuary and the center of the ancient Icelandic tradition of eiderdown farming. A single family serves as the steward for the avian populations, and they walk you through the process of harvesting eiderdown.

Breakfast: Feast Your Eyes on a Fjord

Iceland's rocky coast is carved with more than 100 fjords, many of them found along the country's remote western and eastern shores. After leaving Reykjavík, you'll wake up in a new one nearly every day—and they make the perfect backdrop for a fresh breakfast of made-to-order eggs, fresh pastries and oatmeal and yogurt parfaits with all the fixings.

Morning Excursion: Witness the Earth in Action

Amid Iceland's elemental landscapes, there are a multitude of ways to interact with the living Earth. On a morning excursion, you might walk along a fjord to a thundering waterfall, Zodiac cruise around basalt cliffs studded with seabirds or climb to the rim of a volcanic crater.

Downtime: Scenery at Sea

There's plenty to see from the ship, and while you're relaxing, you may hear your expedition leader call out notable landmarks over the loudspeaker. Among them are Surtsey—one of the world's youngest islands—and the monument on Grímsey island that marks the border of the Arctic Circle. Whales are also plentiful in these parts, and your captain may stop the ship to watch a pod of orcas or humpbacks.

Lunch Is Served

Select from a lunch menu of diverse options that can be tailored to your taste and dietary preferences. Many meals start with a robust soup to ward off the Icelandic chill.

Chat With the Captain

Attend a naturalist talk in the lounge or take advantage of the ship's amenities: read up on geology in the library, test out hightech cameras from the complimentary OM System Photo Gear Locker or visit the open Bridge to chat with the captain about Arctic navigation. Young travelers in the National Geographic Expeditions Adventurers program are invited to join their certified field educator in using the ship microscopes to examine plankton gathered on the morning Zodiac cruise.

Afternoon Excursion: Local Icelandic Life

Voyages offer a rare look at the age-old customs that thrive in the country's remote rural corners. Alongside local Icelanders, delve into traditions like eiderdown processing and herring fishing. Your expedition may also feature a special cultural expert—such as a professor or politician—who joins you throughout the journey to share insights into local Icelandic life.

More to Explore: Get the Perfect Puffin Photo

Several landing sites harbor puffins,* and when you spend time at the edge of their nesting cliffs, keeping as still as possible, they get used to your presence and flutter about their business. Post up alongside your National Geographic photographer and they'll show you how to adjust your shutter speed to get the perfect picture.

Ready for Recap

Meet in the lounge over drinks and hors d'oeuvres, and settle in for the daily recap, featuring presentations and slideshows on the day's adventures and a preview of tomorrow's activities.

Dinner and a Show

Nosh on Nordic cuisine at dinner, sampling a local fish sustainably caught and perfectly prepared by your ship's chef. This evening's entertainment features a local musician hand-selected by the fleet's ethnomusicologist, Jacob Edgar, who curates unique performances that incorporate traditional elements of Icelandic culture.
